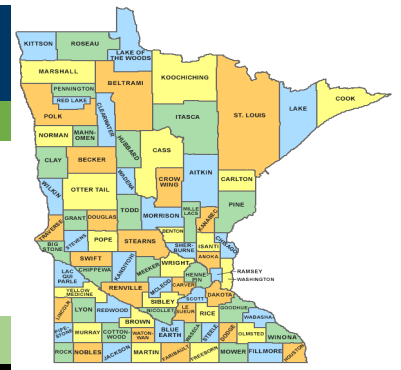


COUNTY PROFILE

Washington Co.

Washington Co. is a part of Economic Development Region 11, which is located in the Twin Cities Planning Region.



POPULATION CHARACTERISTICS

2021 population: **272,256 people**

Washington Co. enjoyed a natural increase - more births than deaths from 2020 to 2021, but also experienced net in-migration - meaning more people moved in than moved out. In addition to domestic in-migration, Washington Co. welcomed net international in-migration - gaining new Minnesotans from foreign countries (see Table 1).

Washington Co.'s population increased over the past decade, ranking as the 5th fastest growing of the 87 counties in the state from 2010 to 2020. It is now the 5th largest in the state. Washington Co.'s population has an older median age than the state and a larger percentage of people aged 65 years and older. The population is aging, especially as the Baby Boom generation moves through the population pyramid (see Figure 1).

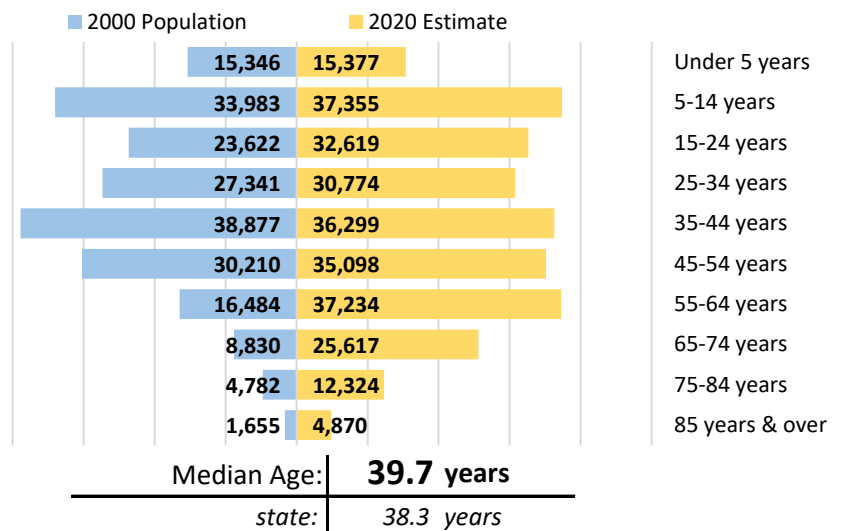

Figure 1. Population Pyramid, 2000-2020

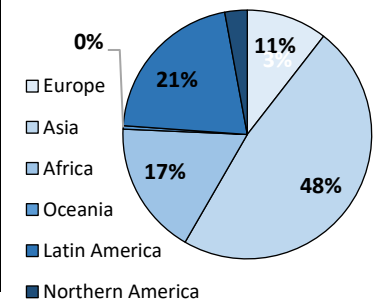

Figure 3. Population by Race, 2020

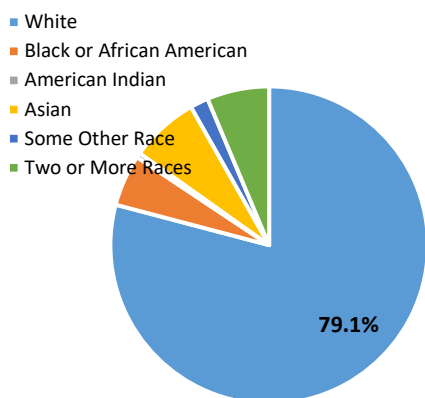

POPULATION PROJECTIONS

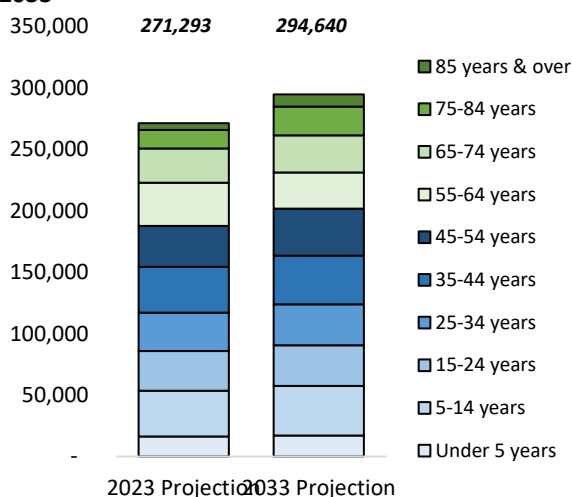
According to the Minnesota State Demographic Center, Washington Co.'s population is expected to grow from 2023 to 2033, with a rate of change that is faster than the projected statewide growth rate (5.6%). In addition to the overall growth, the number of people aged 65 years and older is expected to increase over the next decade (see Figure 4 and Table 5).

EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT

Washington Co. has a higher percentage of adults (18 years & over) with at least a high school diploma than the state (92.8%), and a higher percentage of people with at least some college experience. Washington Co. also has a lower percentage of people with an Associate's degree and a higher percentage of people with a Bachelor's degree or higher.

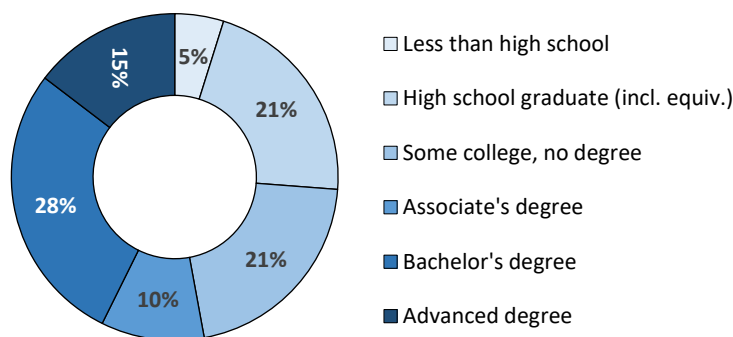

Figure 5. Educational Attainment, 2020



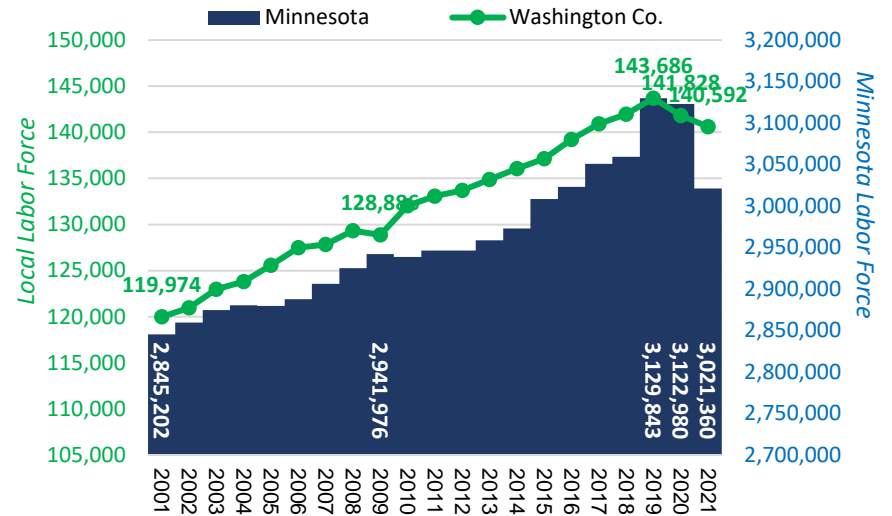

LABOR FORCE TRENDS

At 3.1%, Washington Co. had a lower unemployment rate than the state in 2021. After the pandemic recession Washington Co.'s unemployment rate decreased compared to 5.3% in 2020, and increased compared to the 2.9% rate posted in 2019, pre-pandemic. The number of unemployed workers actively seeking work in Washington Co. declined over the past year, and is up compared to 2019.

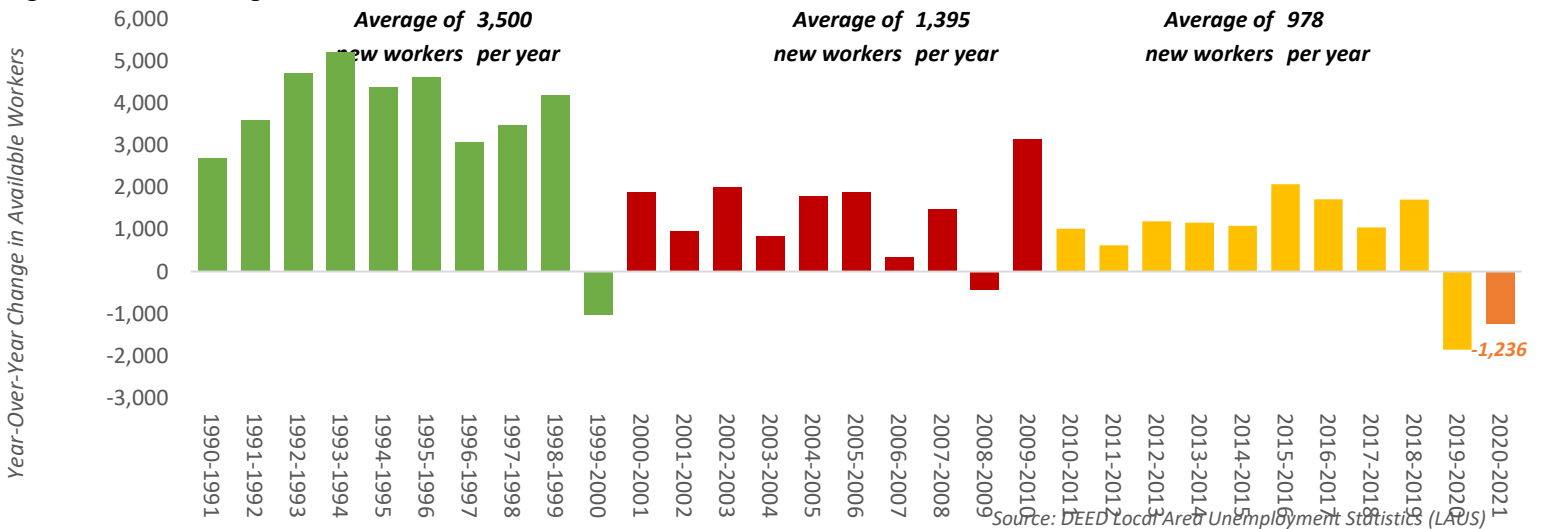
Figure 6. Annual Labor Force Estimates

Labor force growth has slowed in recent years. After experiencing a net gain of 3500.3 workers each year from 1990 to 2000, Washington Co. averaged an annual gain of 1395.4 new workers from 2000 to 2010, and most recently a gain of 978.2 new workers since 2010 (see Figure 7). Moving forward, Washington Co. is expected to add workers from 2023 to 2033 (see Table 6).

Figure 7. Annual Change in Labor Force, 1990-2021



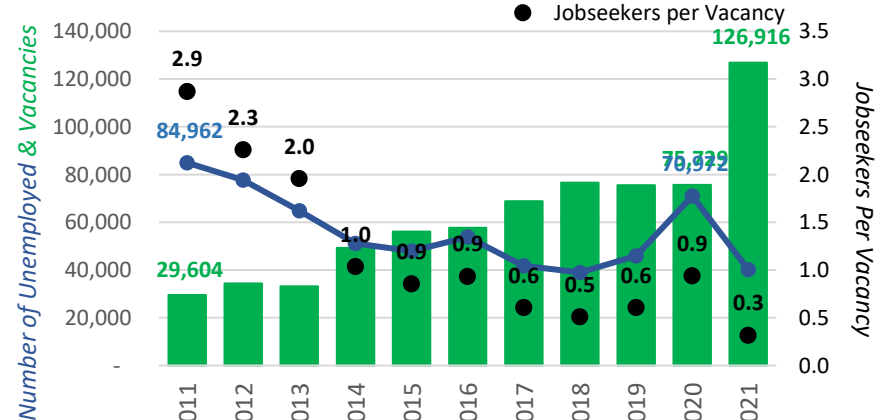

The labor market had grown extremely tight in recent years, with less than 1 jobseeker per vacancy until the pandemic recession intervened in early 2020 and the number of unemployed workers spiked. Job vacancies in Twin Cities reached new highs in the 4th quarter of 2021, quickly bringing back challenges in finding new workers and the lowest jobseeker-per-vacancy ratio on record (see Figure 8).

LABOR FORCE CHARACTERISTICS

Washington Co. had a higher labor force participation rate than the state. The labor force in Washington Co. is less racially diverse than the state (where 84.8% of workers are white alone), but is becoming more diverse over time.

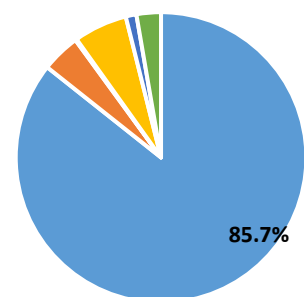

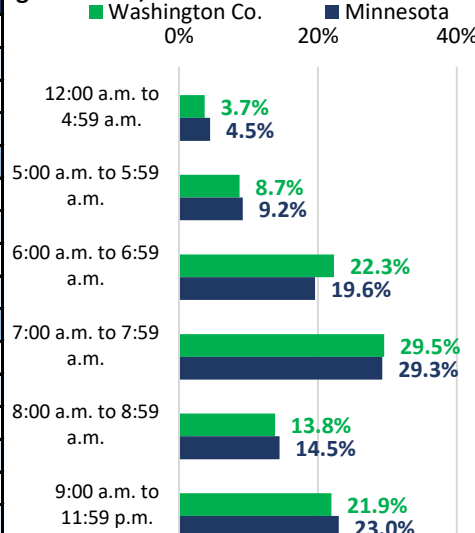

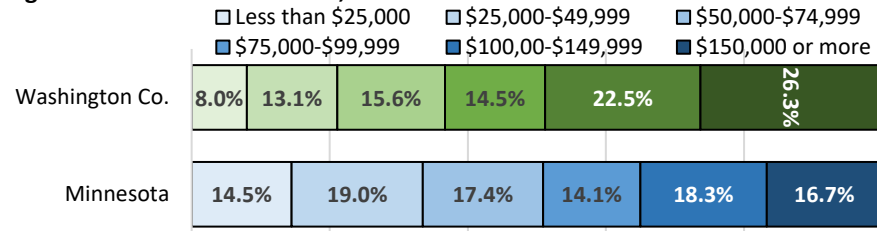
INCOMES, COST OF LIVING, & HOUSING

The cost of living has increased over the past year with costs up in many areas. Washington Co. had a higher cost of living than the state, with a required hourly wage of \$17.62 for a single person living alone to meet a basic needs cost of living, and an hourly wage requirement of \$21.62 for a typical family with 2 adults and 1 child (see Table 9).

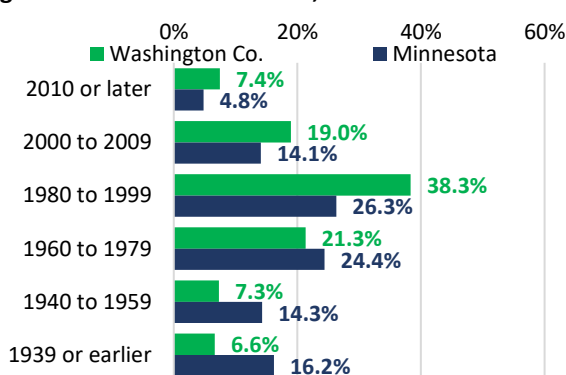

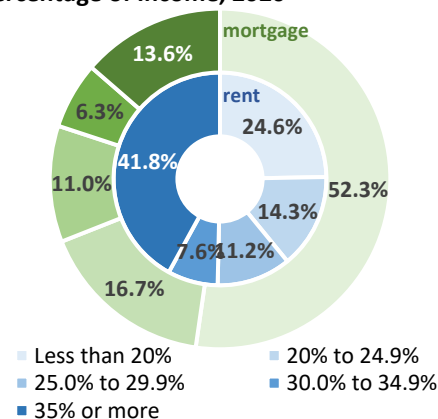

OCCUPATIONS

At \$24.47 in 2021, wages were higher in Region 11 than the state. Overall, Region 11 had the highest median hourly wage level of the 13 economic development regions in the state. Wages were highest for management occupations (\$59.16) and lowest for food preparation and serving related jobs (\$14.9) (see Table 11).

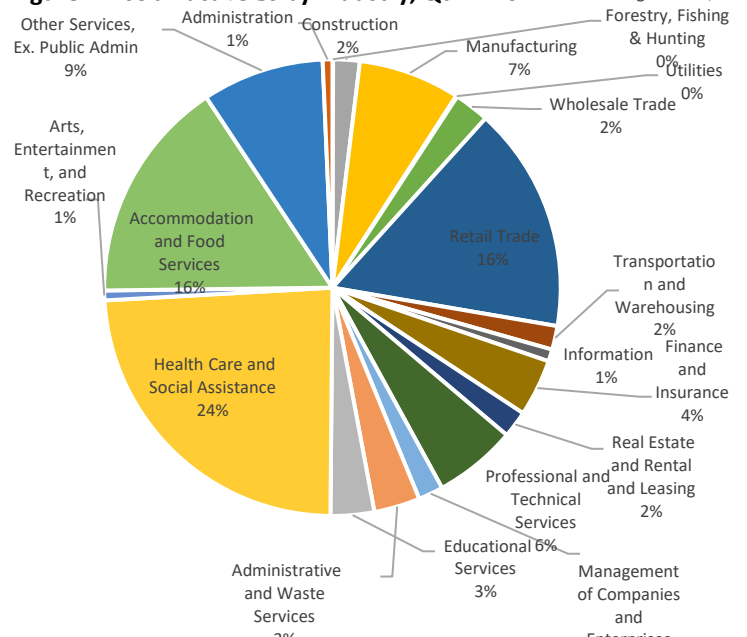
JOB VACANCY SURVEY

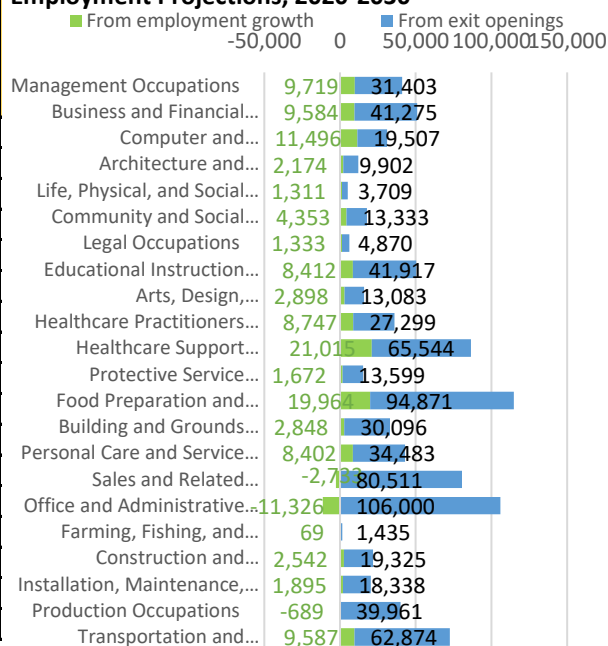

ECONOMIC CHARACTERISTICS

Coming out of the pandemic recession, after gaining jobs over the past year, Washington Co. had the 7th largest economy of the 87 counties in the state. Washington Co. was the 8th fastest growing in the past year and the 12th fastest growing since 2019, prior to the pandemic. From 2019 to 2021, employment in Washington Co. grew despite the pandemic recession.

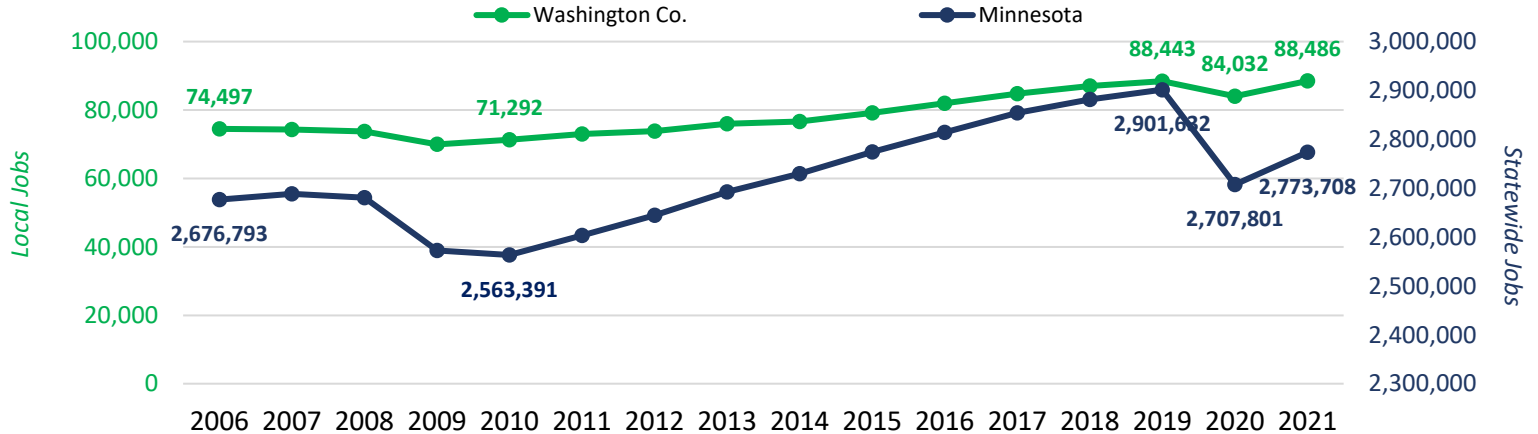

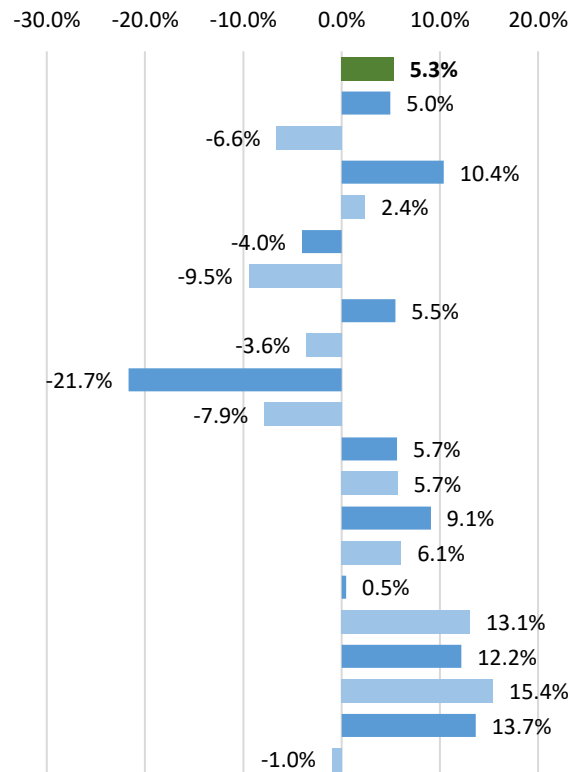
Figure 16. Industry Employment Statistics, 2006-2021
